CAPS started offering services to Spanish speaking families in 2001. Since that time, the team has grown from one part-time employee to 5 fulltime positions. The original hire was made for Family Mentoring, but now the agency is committed to providing all services (except Respite Childcare) in both languages.

How Family Mentoring works

The Family Mentoring program is voluntary. The family either reaches out for services or just needs guidance about the community agency that can help. Most Spanish speaking families reach out to CAPS seeking services by self-referral or word of mouth. Referrals also

the Department for Children and Families, therapists, lawyers, community agencies or other agencies working with children and families. After the initial contact, intake is completed. and an assessment of the family's needs is completed. Next, the CAPS determines if the Family Mentoring program best meets those identified needs or if a referral to other community support would better serve the family.

to participate, a plan is completed and includes one-on-one parenting education through weekly in-home visitation, or evening classes. Family Mentors teach families about parenting through a curriculum or simple life skills, all depending on the needs of the family. without judgement. Mentors guide parents to find self-motivation and improvement to strengthen their family.

If the family agrees

What areas do families need support?

To find the best resources for a client, it's best to understand all areas of their life. A Family Mentor inquires about their housing, jobs, income, community, and relationships to understand where they are lacking support and who might be their best support. Then, the Family Mentor can find resources or direct funding towards the areas that are needed the most to help them thrive. For example, if the client is having trouble finding affordable housing, the Family Mentor will search for resources such as the Saline County Housing Authority which provides housing assistance programs to individuals in Saline County.

Assisting families to reach independence

The goal of Family Mentoring is to ensure that the families have

the best support for years to come and can advocate for themselves. The Family Mentor must try to help the family establish their own independence, which includes guiding the family to educate themselves on their rights, what resources are available to them, and where they can go for help. This is crucial if they need help in the future, so they can find it and act sooner. It's better if the Family Mentor acts as more of a person of guidance for the families. As the old proverb says, "Give a person a fish and you feed them for a day; teach a person to fish and you feed them for a lifetime."

Spanish Parent Education

CAPS provides Spanish Speaking parenting education through the Family Mentoring program, but also evening classes at CAPS and online via Zoom. Parenting classes are facilitated in Spanish to build new

parenting skills and new methods for parents of children in different age groups. CAPS Spanish Speaking educators strive to teach parents new and rewarding kills to develop happier and more fulfilling parenting experiences. CAPS Spanish Speaking educators have overcome some barriers and some culture norms to reach Spanish

speaking parents and teach them new skills.

CAPS also provides a bilingual library of educational books for parents and children to borrow and check-out. It is in the front lobby of the CAPS office.

Commitment to the families

One of the greatest

parts about being a Bilingual Family Mentor is helping families and helping them enter a world of opportunity that might have been difficult to access before. Some families may have limited English and are wanting to find resources including classes to teach the English language. The families are so welcoming and

happy to have help. Mentors are committed to serving families and work hard to connect clients with programs to better themselves. By serving the Spanish speaking communities, CAPS is able to improve more childrens' lives and strengthen more families in our community.
